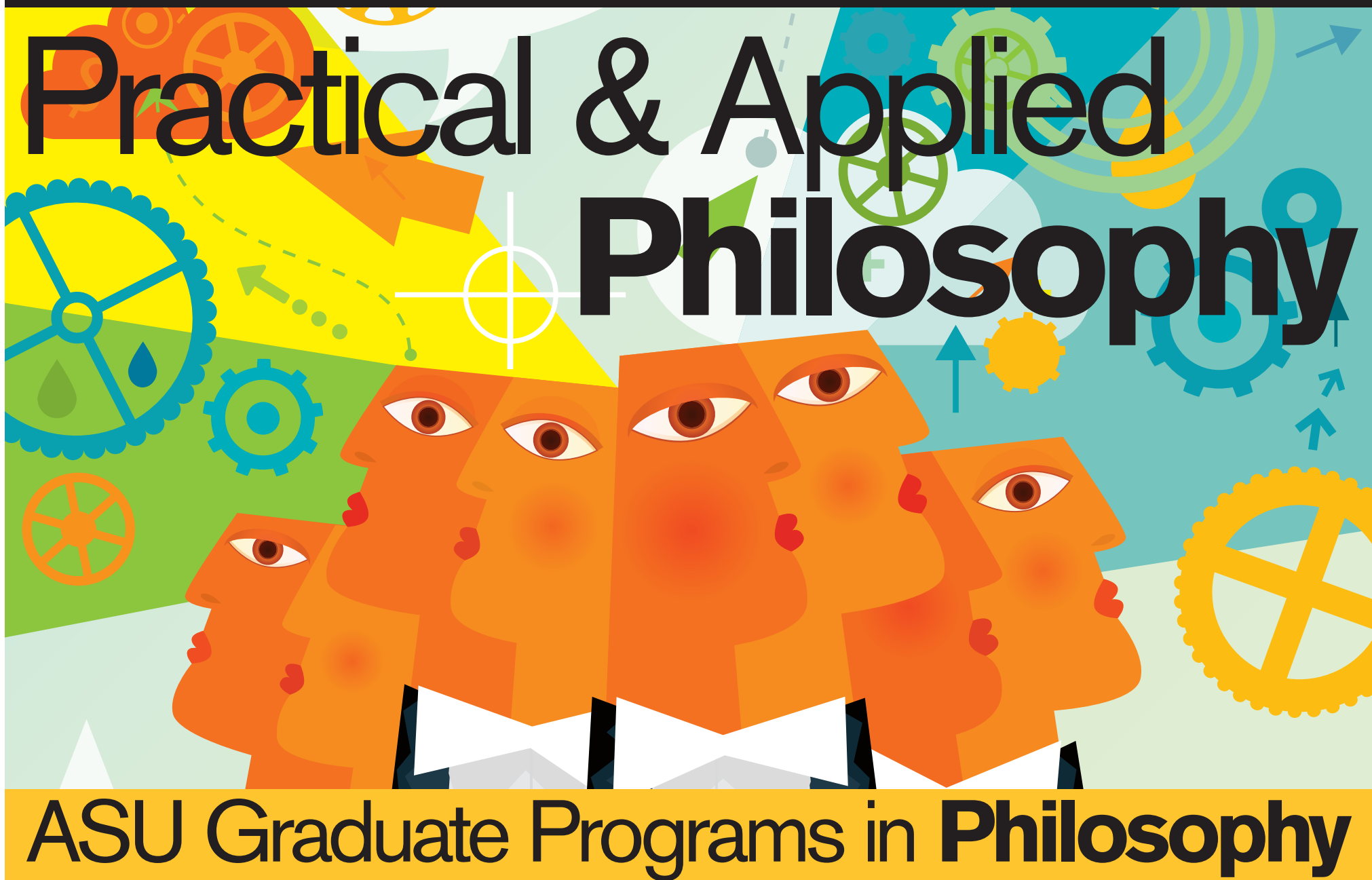

Applied Philosophy includes both the application of theories developed within any of the sub-disciplines of philosophy to everyday problems or phenomena, as well as the application of research and tools used in other disciplines to understanding and addressing philosophical questions (e.g., experimental philosophy).

Interdisciplinary coursework supporting the student's thesis project is a component of the PhD program, and there is the opportunity to work with philosophy graduate faculty in our school and in the School of Life Sciences, the Sandra Day O'Connor College of Law and others.
